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# Weaning buffalo calves to eat and do not miss the milk as much as

Weaning buffalo calves is like everything else in the buffalo business. Some people are for it and some are against it. I believe in weaning for several reasons:

1. It is cheaper to feed the calf than to feed the cow enough for her to feed the calf.

2. The calves do better since they are not competing with the larger animals for the choice feed.

4. The calves are easier to watch and evaluate when they are alone. I have never even been able to get a good count on my calves when they are on the cow.

5. It is much easier to sort off a few calves and sell when they are separate from the herd.

6. It is easier to get a higher pregnancy rate among your cows if you wean each year.

If an older calf is allowed to continue to

nurse it drags the cow down to where she is much more likely to skip a year.

7. It lets the cow build up and give all of her attention to the new calf. I have heard of yearlings nursing and the new calf not surviv-

8. It lets me really save on the groceries that I give the mother cows in the winter in this part of the country.

9. It seems to make the mother cows much easier to work with if the calves have been removed for 3-4 weeks. Procedures such as preg testing can be done much easier as well as not having the worry of injuring calves while handling the cows.
